## PET EMERGENCY / FUTURE PLANNING CHECKLIST

## **Documentation:**

Display a Pet Alert sticker conspicuously near the entrance to your home.



Keep a card in your wallet (behind your driver's license is a good place) with your emergency contact information and pet details in case you're in an accident.

If you live alone and/or have a pet that has a medical condition, you may consider...



Giving permission to access your home in case of an emergency.

If you are an Arlington County resident, you can draft a document permitting AWLA's Animal Control Officers entry into your residence in case of an emergency. Please provide AWLA and, if applicable, your property management company, with a copy of this document so there are no questions if/when an emergency arises. (If you live elsewhere, contact your local animal services facility for advice and information.)



Keeping a printed copy of your pet's medical needs on your refrigerator where First Responders typically check when accessing a home in an emergency.

## Your Will:

Speak to an attorney or estate planner about making a provision in your will, or creating a pet trust, to designate a person, rescue, or shelter to care for your pet in the event that you are unable to do so.



Permit access to your home if necessary. (See above for more info on this)

State where your pet is regularly vetted. This can be as simple as: "Fido's medical history and records are available at his/her primary vet named XXXX under [Owner's Name]."

## **Other Considerations:**

Prepare a "go-bag" for you and your pet(s) and store it where you can easily grab it and go in case of an emergency.

Items to consider for your pet "go-bag" include food, water, medicine, first aid kit, extra collar with ID tag, carrier, sanitation needs, towels, blankets, toys, comfort items, a photograph of your and your pet together, and your contact information.

Microchip your pet and make sure the number is registered with <u>Petwatch</u> <u>Found Animals</u> (https://tinyurl.com/59v7dj6y). Confirm that your contact information is correct and periodically check to make sure it is up-to-date. This will ensure that, even if your pet loses its collar or tags, shelters and veterinary hospitals can scan the chip and reunite them with you.
